### **High School Season in Full Swing**

Te are publishing our first boys' and girls' rankings of the season. With all the challenges these past two years, I am hopeful that the wrestling season will get on track for all to enjoy.

The boys' rankings start on page 6 of this issue as our High School All-Class Rankings put together by Dan Fickel for over 30 years. Pennsylvania, who many consider the toughest wrestling state in the country, leads the nation with 50 wrestlers ranked in the top 30 and five top-ranked wrestlers: 113 lbs. Luke Lilledahl, 132 lbs. Nic Bousakis, 160 lbs. Levi Haines, 170 lbs. Gabe Arnold, and 285 lbs. Nicholas Feldman. The state of Ohio has 38 wrestlers ranked in the top 30 lead by top ranked Dylan Fishback at 195 pounds. California, the largest wrestling state in the country, and Iowa both have 31 ranked wrestlers, followed by the second largest wrestling state Illinois with 21.

Girls' wrestling has continued to grow not only at the high school level, but at the college level as well. There are an enormous amount of opportunities for girls to excel in one of the greatest and toughest sports on the planet. The *National Wrestling* Coaches Association (NWCA) has been instrumental in promoting and growing women's wrestling. Since 1994, the number of girls who are wrestling in high school has grown from 804 to over 28,000. There are now 32 states that have sanctioned girls' wrestling as an official scholastic state championship, and over 100 colleges that now sponsor a varsity women's wrestling program. We would like to thank the National Wrestling Hall of Fame, USA Wrestling, and FloWrestling for giving us the opportunity to publish the national girls' high school rankings starting on page 30.

Not a surprise that the largest girls' wrestling state, California, has the most topranked wrestlers with five: 100 lbs. Brianna Gonzales, 122 lbs. Katie Gomez, 132 lbs. Janida Garcia, 152 lbs. Amit Elor, and 200 lbs. Sam Calkins. The senior class also dominate the girls' rankings with a total of eight out of the fourteen weight classes. California also leads the way with 33 girls ranked in the top 25. Illinois has 15 girls ranked in the top 25, followed by Indiana and Ohio with 14, and Iowa and Pennsylvania each with 13.

As we continue to move forward in this great sport we love, Wrestling USA Magazine would like to wish coaches, wrestlers, parents, and fans a successful 2021-2022 wrestling season.

Now with the Holiday Season among us, I am so thankful for my parents, my brother LaMonte and his wife Christine, and of course we can't forget their puppy Valentino - cutest puppy ever (almost a year old), who not only tried to destroy my house but terrorized my neighbors' dogs! 

# The Jadon Skellenger Story Intrinsically Motivated

n life, we only get one shot at it. That is the one shot at reaching our full potential in the journey we call life. There are no second chances or rewinds in the process, but in light of this reality, we are provided one simple caveat. For instance, during the course of our life, we have the opportunity to learn and grow from our shortcomings and failed experiences. Thereby, we should not permit any of our failures or even demons of doubt to deter us from reaching our full potential or the outcome we desire. Always moving forward and learning from our experiences is more important than anything else in the process. What is destiny? According to Merriam-Webster dictionary, DESTINY is defined as: what happens in the future: the things that someone or something will experience in the future. I have been involved with wrestling for over four decades and have observed my share of exceptionally talented wrestlers. One wrestler in particular that I have had the distinct pleasure to meet recently, who in my opinion is destined to reach great heights in wrestling and life, is seventeen year old Jadon Skellenger of Meridian, Idaho. Without a doubt, Jadon's focus and commitment to reach the pinnacle of our great sport is unparalleled for a kid his age. Not one accolade he has achieved thus far has been automatic, given to him, or unchallenging. The common denominator for his successes has been in his vision, unmitigated focus, sacrifice, and determination to excel to the highest level, which to date has established him as one of America's top wrestling young prospects. His journey thus far has been very interesting and impressive. Jadon's journey has just begun and his future is yet to be written, so let me take you back in time to the genesis of his mat career and journey.

The setting was no different than any other local or state level tournament held across America. The high school gymnasium was jam packed filled with hundreds of grade school wrestlers, screaming coaches, parents, and fans. The event was the October 2009 California World Challenge held on the campus of Clovis West High School in the Central Valley, among the hotbeds of prep wrestling in the country. Representing the Concord Youth Center (CYC) in the Rookie 45 pound weight group, Jadon sprinted to the center of the mat with sheer determination, ready to do battle for the first time in his mat career (match refereed by California Hall-of-Fame recipient Rick McKinney). Only 5 years of age, Jadon wasted no time attacking his opponent with a double leg shot to immediately secure the first takedown of the match and then a near fall...From the first whistle to the final seconds of the match, Jadon showed a great deal of promise for a very young novice in the sport; great hips, constant movement, mat awareness, and always battling for position. He looked very confident and comfortable on the mat, as if it were natural. The outcome in this high scoring match was a convincing win for Jadon. Immediately after getting his arm raised in victory for the first time, he ran to the edge of the mat into the arms of his mother, Amy, and then father, Brian in celebration. Despite ultimately finishing second in his first competition, It was at this moment; Jadon was hooked on wrestling and from this point

forward he has not stopped competing and pursuing his goals.

Rewind the calendar back several months from Jadon's first tournament competition at the California World Challenge and hindsight would have told us that all leading indicators in his day-today life as a four year old were subliminally pointing in the direction of wrestling. Never participating in organized sports during his childhood, Jadon's father, Brian, knew that he wanted to do the opposite with his children and provide them with the opportunity to partake in some type of sport or extracurricular activities. The first introduction to any organized extracurricular activity came in the form of a father and son soccer league where from the start Jadon was so assertive on the field that he was often encouraged to take breaks from play. Next came T-Ball, the predecessor to possibly playing Little League Baseball in the future years to come. Strike two, it didn't take long for Jadon to disapprove and want to move on to something else. According to his father, the concept of T-Ball made no sense to Jadon or appealed to him. Nothing seemed to appeal to him. Then out of left field, while sitting in his child seat on a ride home from T-ball, Jadon spouted out "I want to wrestle in college someday." His parent's immediate response was, "what do you mean, wrestling...WWE?" From that point forward in the conversation, Jadon was determined and insisted that he wanted to wrestle. Ironically, the concept, viewing it on television, or any discussion of wrestling, had never taken place in their household. To this day, neither Jadon, nor his parents are able to pinpoint where his idea of wrestling or influence to compete in college came from. Regardless, it was Jadon's proposal that sent the Skellenger family on a trajectory to unknown territory.

Not having any conceptual framework of wrestling or where to initially look for opportunities, Jadon's mother, Amy, scoured the internet for several days and eventually came upon an upcoming youth camp that was being held at the Concord Youth Center (CYC) in the East Bay Area of California. Unbeknownst to Amy, the CYC was nationally recognized as one of the top Greco-Roman development clubs led by then Head Coach Mark Halvorson, a member of the 2016 Olympic coaching staff (Note: To date, CYC has produced several world team members, 1 Junior World Medalist, 40 National Champions, 135 All-Americans, 230 State Champions, and more recently 2016 Olympic Greco team member Robby Smith and 2021 World Greco Team Member Peyton Omania). When Amy and Brian presented Jadon with the opportunity to attend the CYC camp, it was obvious from the beginning that he was very excited and ready to go. His sense of enthusiasm to wrestle far exceeded any other sport activity attempted in the past. Despite the youngest age allowed to enter the camp being 5 (Jadon was 4 ½, but turning 5 within a month), his mother fibbed about his age and with a "thumbs up" from camp coach Kenneth Cook, Jadon was given the opportunity to try out for at least a day and go from there. By days end, it was not difficult to surmise that Jadon had a great time and wanted to remain at the camp. With the validation from Coach Cook, Amy was assured that her son was more than welcome to complete the remainder of

### Hall of Fame Will Host 45th Honors Weekend June 3-4, 2022

For the first time in its 45-year history, the National Wrestling Hall of Fame will induct two female wrestlers as Distinguished Members in the same year. Clarissa Chun and Sara McMann will be inducted alongside Jake Varner as Distinguished Members representing the Modern Era, while Andy Rein was selected by the Veterans Committee.

Rounding out the 2022 class of inductees are Meritorious Official Tom Clark, Order of Merit recipient Mike Moyer and Medal of Courage recipient Melissa Simmons.

The Outstanding American honoree will be announced later.

The induction ceremony will be held at the 45th Honors Weekend on June 3-4, 2022 in Stillwater, Oklahoma. For more information on Honors Weekend, please telephone (405) 377-5243.

"Following an extensive screening and selection process, I am excited to announce such a notable and deserving group of honorees for 2022," said Lee Roy Smith, Executive Director of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame. "We are fortunate to be able to spotlight these inductees who have transcended our sport's heritage over the past 40 years. It

is also a class that represents the positive transformational impact females are realizing in wrestling, with two female Distinguished Members and our first female Medal of Courage recipient."

The newest honorees will bring the number of Distinguished Members to 204, since the Hall of Fame began in 1976. Chun and McMann become the third and fourth female Distinguished Members, joining

Tricia Saunders (2006) and Kristie Davis (2018).

Simmons is the first female selected to receive the Medal of Courage and her selection marks

only the second time that three women have been included in one induction class. The Class of 1998 included Sandy Stevens receiving the Order of Merit and Sue Siar and Sally Stanford being honored as Meritorious Officials.

Rein becomes the 10th and final member of the 1984 United States Olympic freestyle team to be honored as a Distinguished Member, making it the only Olympic team to have every team member recognized.

## The Official's Sportsmanship

n recent years, I have stressed time and again the importance of sportsmanship in athletes, coaches, and fans. I think we also should consider the same from officials as well

Before I begin this discussion, I think it is imperative that all my readers realize I have been an official for many years (baseball and wrestling). So, I am not picking on officials without having been there for over three decades.

I recall two different occurrences involving referees who did not conduct themselves in a professional manner. The first instance involved a professional official who was very rude to a coach at an athletic clinic. He was quite condescending to a high school coach, who just asked some basic questions regarding the sport. And he did so in a very sincere manner.

This referee felt he was above such questions from a lowly scholastic coach, and attempted to embarrass the mentor. He was unsportsmanlike, and those in attendance knew it.

The second situation involved a professional competition in which the coach was removed from the premises. Not only did this coach's team win the contest handily, but he also won the 400th game of his career. His comments to the press after the event were that he finally got fed up with the official's "arrogance."

Coaches deserve respect, too. Officials need to understand their place in sports. Their job is to interpret the rules to the best of their knowledge. And foremost in the minds and hearts of every official should be the health and safety of the athletes. They should be the protectors of the game's physical enjoyment and statutes, not gods.

I have always tried to be firm as an official. But at the same time,

I have demonstrated a respectful attitude toward the coaches and athletes. I believe that any time a coach asks a legitimate question, he deserves a response from the official. As a dedicated mentor, who spends many hours training his athletes, he deserves that courtesy.

One final point. as an official, I have made my share of mistakes. (It's the price we pay for being human.) And I found that honesty is truly the best policy when dealing with coaches. Yes, I freely admit that I have, at times, told coaches that I "blew the call." Every time I did so, the coach responded, "Well, okay, but don't let it happen again." He accepted my admission, but more importantly, the coach respected my integrity.

After all, how can one argue if both parties agree?

Yes, officials have a very serious task to perform in athletics. Control of the contest should be high on their priority list, along with safety, but not at the expense of professional courtesy toward the coaches and athletes. No official or referee should ever become bigger than the game, itself.

After all, "sports are for the kids...not the adults."
